I would love to skate at Nationals this year because it is an Olympic year. It is going to be very exciting. I am still training very hard and if I go to Nationals, I will add at least another hour to my daily training. There have been so many people that have asked me to stay in the competitive ranks; I cannot believe there are so many people that care about me like that.

Q: Since you skated and competed so very well this year, aren't you interested in seeing if you could go even further next year?

A: There are two reasons why I

and soon will be 18, we will lose some of that, so to say we won't have the money is the truth. I know my Mom would do anything she could to make it happen if I wanted it but I don't want to see her give up more than she already has. Q: How does it feel to be leaving the competitive arena as the highest ranked Junior Ladies' skater in SDFSC?

A: This is something I never thought I would be able to achieve, so to say I am elated and beaming with pride is just putting it mildly!

Q: How about school? When will you graduate? How will you fit continuing your education in with being on tour with ice shows?

A: I plan on graduating in December. As far as college, I plan on taking some classes at a community college. If I am not accepted for a show, I will enter classes, if I get offered a show I will put it off until I finish show skating. The ice is my life, every plan I have for my future is surrounded by ice.

## Focus on Coaching

Natasha Bobrina - From Russia ... with love.



### *Q:* When you were a child, what did you want to be when you grew up?

**A**: I always had a desire to be a doctor. However, nobody in my family had anything to do with medicine and therefore could not give me the proper guidance to follow this dream. I also think they did not realize how much I wanted to do this but, my passion for medicine was passed along to my son, Maxim, who is an orthopedic surgeon in St. Petersburg. I am so proud of his accomplishments!

## Q: How old were you, and where did you live, when you started skating?

**A**: I started skating when I was seven and a half. I began skating because my brother Yuri was already in the sport and I wanted to be just like him. I was born and raised in St. Petersburg, Russia (previously known as Leningrad, second biggest city in the Soviet Union). It is a beautiful city and one We see them every day, we entrust our children to them to train and to mold, but how much do we know about them? of the most historical, cultural places in Europe. I love to visit my city and go home at least once a year.

## Q: What discipline did you begin with?

A. I started to skate as a single skater doing free skating and figures. When I was training we spent at least half of our time on the ice practicing figures, which of course now are no longer a part of competitive skating system. When I turned 13, I added pairs to my training schedule which was much harder as it took twice as long to train than before.

#### Q: Please tell us about your competitive career. How far did you go?

A: When I was 15 my partner and I won the Junior National Pairs Championship for Russia. At the age of 16 I became the Junior National Singles Champion. Advancing to the Senior level of competition I was ranked 5th in the nation for both singles and pairs. Andrey Suraykin, my pair partner for the last three years of my competitive career, was the 1972 Olympic Silver Pairs medalist. It was at this time in my life that I learned how to not only love skating but to also understand how much this fantastic sport could change my life forever. Andrey was my coach, my partner and my friend. Our time skating together was the most meaningful and special part of my career.

## *Q: Where and when did you become a skating coach?*

A: After my competitive skating career, I traveled for three years

with the St. Petersburg ballet on ice show. I was hired by the St. Petersburg figure skating club to teach primarily pairs before being asked by the Finland Skating Federation to be head coach for their competitive skaters. During my seven years in Finland, I was fortunate enough to train both the Novice and Junior ladies National Champions along with one of the girls who became the Worlds Silver medalist in Synchronized Skating.

## *Q: What do you enjoy most about coaching?*

A: It is a real joy to see how young students who every day, little by little, take their basic skills to a more advanced level. I enjoy seeing them develop their passion for skating, working harder to be able to express themselves with music and movement. I try to pass on my knowledge to each and every one of my students so they can one day learn to love what they do, believe in themselves, show their own personality and develop their own sense of style since each skater is unique and special.

#### Q: What is the downside?

A: For me, I do not think there is a downside to coaching. I love my career and feel very passionate about teaching. I make an effort to always stay on top of the sport and its ever changing ways. As a coach, you must constantly educate yourself in all areas of the sport.
